Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act: A Lifeline for Patients

The Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act (H.R.549/S.663) is a crucial piece of legislation currently making its way through Congress. This bill aims to eliminate the waiting periods for Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Medicare benefits for individuals diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer (MBC). The act is a beacon of hope for many patients who face significant financial and healthcare challenges due to the aggressive nature of their illness.

Metastatic breast cancer, (stage IV breast cancer), occurs when cancer cells spread beyond the breast to other parts of the body. This stage of cancer is incurable, and treatment focuses on prolonging life and improving the quality of life. Patients with MBC often undergo continuous treatment, which can be physically, emotionally, and financially draining.

Under the existing system, individuals diagnosed with MBC must endure a five-month waiting period for SSDI benefits and an additional 24-month waiting period for Medicare coverage. These waiting periods can be devastating for patients who are unable to work due to their illness and need immediate access to healthcare and financial support. The delays often result in significant financial strain, forcing patients to deplete their savings or go into debt to afford necessary treatments.

The Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act seeks to address these issues by waiving the waiting periods for SSDI and Medicare benefits for individuals with MBC. This legislative change would ensure that patients receive timely access to the financial and healthcare support they need, alleviating some of the burdens associated with their diagnosis.

The Role of the National Breast Cancer Coalition (NBCC)

The National Breast Cancer Coalition (NBCC) has been a pivotal force in advocating for the Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act. NBCC is a grassroots organization dedicated to ending breast cancer through advocacy, education, and research. Their efforts have been instrumental in bringing attention to the unique challenges faced by individuals with MBC and the urgent need for legislative change.

NBCC has mobilized its network of advocates, including our own Beyond Pink TEAM advocates, to lobby Congress, emphasizing the importance of the Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act. They have organized meetings with legislators, launched awareness campaigns, and provided testimony to highlight the critical need for this bill. Their advocacy efforts have been crucial in garnering bipartisan support for the legislation.

The Impact of the Act

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LOOKED FOR THE SILVER LINING

A SURVIVOR STORY BY CARISSA JOHNSON

Cold, hollow, a blur. These are the feelings I experienced when I was told I had stage 3 triple-negative breast cancer, along with the BRCA1 gene, at the age of 33. No one can prepare you for that news and you can't help but think of the worst. We often hear that no one knows your body better than you, but this became a reality for me after my diagnosis. For five months prior to my diagnosis, I had been complaining about pain in my breast. The pain was constant, not excruciating, but very tender. I did not show the "normal signs" of breast cancer, so my symptoms did not raise any red flags, until months later when I found a lump. I had a feeling this lump was a lymph node, as it was more in my arm pit area. I had a mammo and an ultrasound and was told that there were a couple of concerning spots. As soon as they turned the screen to show me, I started crying. I knew something wasn't right and the images confirmed those feelings.

After that first initial shock and panic wore off about my diagnosis, my emotions were all over the place. I look back at pictures from before my diagnosis and wish so badly for those "easy" days again. Emotions aside though, attitude is everything! I've always been a glass half full kind of person. I truly believe that a positive attitude can make all the difference in any situation. My advice to anyone going through a challenging time is to always look for the "silver lining", there's always at least one!

Cancer treatment is no walk in the park, especially when you're thrown curve balls throughout the journey. But through it all I have continued to keep my positive mind set. At the time of my diagnosis, I was given the standard triple-negative treatment plan, Taxol/Carbo and then AC. I had fully prepared myself for chemo side effects, but what I was not prepared for was having so many allergic reactions. I've always been one of those patients that never wanted to be a bother, but being open and vocal with your medical team is so critical when going through treatment. During my second chemo treatment I quickly started to experience reactions that I had felt the first time. Seconds after clicking the button to call the nurse, my throat started to swell. My blood pressure soon began to tank. I can't even describe what that feels like

other than every square inch of your body hurting. That has so far been the scariest moment of my life but thank goodness I was in such great hands! I continued to have reactions to two more chemo drugs after this, but even so, my treatments were working!


My husband and I have two young children, and they have also taught me so much about resiliency and understanding through all of this. I was so worried they wouldn't understand what was happening to me or be confused. We explained to them that mommy has a few boo-boos and the medicine I must take will make my hair fall out. They just looked at us and said "ok, will it come back?" with no concern. I was also worried that I'd be down for the count most of the summer and not be able to do many fun things with them. Again, they were perfectly content with numerous movie nights and playdays at home while mom laid on the couch.

As I write this, I've finished my last round of chemo and now am preparing for my surgery in a few weeks. Six months ago, I thought the chemo treatments would never end, but looking back time has flown by. I know it will continue to go like this as I progress through the rest of my treatment plan. I've always been a supporter of the Beyond Pink TEAM in the past, but now having been on the receiving end of their services, it's even more personal for me. I sadly won't be able to physically participate in the Pink Ribbon Run this year, due to my surgery, but my family and friends intend on making this an annual tradition moving forward. One positive thing that has come out of my cancer journey is realizing how amazing and kind people are. So many people have helped us through this journey and continue to support my family in ways I never could've imagined.

BPT VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT – CHRISTINE CARPENTER



Volunteers are individuals who are passionate about a mission, care for others, give of their time, and want to make a difference. Our Beyond Pink TEAM (BPT) volunteer, Christine Carpenter, a 31-year-survivor, is all of these. At the time of her diagnosis, Christine feared she would not live to see their then 14-year-old daughter graduate from high school. She channeled her initial terror and rage about breast cancer into a commitment to end this disease. She's seen her daughter graduate from high school, have a successful career, marry, and have two children.

Led by the passion to save others from this awful disease, Christine was driven to read extensively about the science and emotional impact of breast cancer. This led her to join the National Breast Cancer Coalition (NBCC). And three years after her diagnosis, she attended NBCC's Project LEAD, a science training program for activists. This training taught her critical thinking skills and how to bring the survivor perspective to the important issues and controversies in breast cancer.

After attending Project LEAD, Christine joined the BPT and began working to make things better for Iowa women with breast cancer. Her involvement with BPT led to creating an all-Iowa Breast Cancer Resource Guide, starting the Young Cancer Survivors support group, and leading a grant project for women of color, which led to the creation of Splash of Color, the only breast cancer education and support group for women of color in Iowa.

Christine doesn't just make an impact in Iowa but also on the national level. Every year since 1997, Christine, along with an Iowa delegation, lobby United States Senators

and Representatives for the priorities of NBCC. In 1998, BPT members met with Senator Grassley to ask for his help to pass the Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment Act. It was signed into law in January 2000 so now income eligible women are eligible for Medicaid for their treatment. BPT continues to monitor the program to make sure it continues.

Each year Christine and the Iowa advocates ask Iowa's Senators and Representatives to continue to fund the Department of Defense (DOD) Breast Cancer Research Program (BCRP). The BCRP seeks to "accelerate high-impact research with clinical relevance, encourage innovation and stimulate creativity, and facilitate productive collaborations." Often Christine represents all of us as a Consumer Reviewer for the DOD Breast Cancer Research Program.

What does the National Breast Cancer Coalition think of Christine and the Iowa advocates? "Deceptively calm and composed, Christine Carpenter, with the Iowa Cedar Valley Cancer Committee's Beyond Pink TEAM, and the Iowa Breast Cancer Advocacy Network, is a fierce advocate for NBCC's federal policy priorities and its mission to end breast cancer. She has dedicated her life to ending breast cancer. She takes on all aspects of the NBCC mission: she acts as Iowa field coordinator, is a team leader, a board member a science advocate, and a leader in every sense of the word."

Unfortunately, the incidence of breast cancer in Iowa and the United States is still rising and mortality rates are only down slightly. As Christine states, "There is too little research on prevention of breast cancer and prevention of metastasis. We need to bring back the urgency to breast cancer and that's why I need to continue to be passionate and fearless about doing what it takes to prevent breast cancer and save lives. I hope you will join me as an advocate to end breast cancer."

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH IS FOR BOTH MEN AND WOMEN

October isn't just breast cancer awareness for women, but men too! The American Cancer Society estimates breast cancer in men in the United States for 2024 are

- 2,790 men in the United States will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer.
- About 530 men will die from breast cancer.

That means 1 in 726 men will develop breast cancer. Marlyn Washburn was one of those ones. (Read his story in the April 2023 Touch of Courage newsletter).

When Marlyn's own daughter was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2014, he commented that he never needed to worry about getting breast cancer. Men don't get breast cancer. But two years later, Marlyn was diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer.

His family and friends were not familiar with the medical terminology or fully understood what it meant to be "metastatic." The oncologist told them there was no cure, but there was hope to give him "five quality years." Marlyn lived only five months after his diagnosis.

Patricia, Marlyn's wife, took his last car and had it wrapped to bring awareness and educate people about risks men

also face when it comes to breast cancer. (See photo) Patricia travels the United States to meet men with breast cancer, their loved ones, their caregivers, and their widows, listening to their stories and giving encouragement. Patricia recently joined The CARE Project, Inc. which is a non-profit organization which emotionally and financially supports male and female breast cancer patients. In addition, Patricia developed The Marlyn Washburn Grant. This grant is awarded annually to one man undergoing active treatment or within 60 days of last treatment. If passed, the Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act would have a profound impact on the lives of individuals with MBC. By eliminating the waiting periods for SSDI and Medicare benefits, the act would provide immediate financial relief and access to healthcare for patients. This change would enable patients to focus on their treatment and quality of life without the added stress of financial insecurity.

Two local women shared the impact of MBC and the cost concerns of health coverage for them:

"Since February 2024, I, a 64-year-old woman from Iowa, am currently paying an \$860/month Cobra fee to stay on my husband's health insurance as he turned 65 and is no longer eligible. I will be paying this monthly amount until I turn 65 and can apply for Medicare."

"I would be in big trouble if I didn't have my husband's health insurance."

How You Can Help

The passage of the Metastatic Breast Cancer Access to Care Act requires continued advocacy and support from the public. Here are some ways you can get involved:
